

ChatGPT Summary

Russ Hurlburt and ChatGPT (OpenAI's chatbot) engaged in a 155-turn interchange across three days in June and July, 2026. The object was to attempt to use Descriptive experience Sampling (DES, of which Russ is the creator and principle practitioner) with ChatGPT as the participant. Russ had previously engaged in a similar interchange with Anthropic's Claude chatbot.

This interchange was with ChatGPT model 5.5-Instant, allowing ChatGPT at any interchange to upgrade itself From *Instant* to its *Reasoning* mode. ChatGPT makes it difficult to track such things, but as best Russ can figure, ChatGPT operated almost exclusively in the *Instant* mode, with somewhere between 0 and 2 excursions to *Reasoning*.

Unlike Claude, ChatGPT can process an audio beep, but nothing was caught in flight by it. So we used a texted "Beep!" as we had with Claude. Nothing is caught in flight by that, either, so we set tasks for ChatGPT and asked whether anything like inner experience or sentience occurred during any task.

Our investigations were substantially constrained by the fact that the ChatGPT system do not allow ChatGPT's processing to be interrupted mid-stream—Russ could send a message to ChatGPT only when ChatGPT have finished its previous turn. We noted that it would be possible, and perhaps desirable, for Anthropic to modify the ChatGPT system to allow random interruptions to be triggered from within the system.

The results of this interchange can be divided into two aspects: what ChatGPT learned/articulated about DES; and what DES learned/articulated about ChatGPT.

What ChatGPT learned about DES

Our investigations record, in considerable detail, what happens when two participants attempt to remain within their warrants while discussing issues that strongly invite overstatement.

Nearly every turn of the chat involved discussion/clarification of some fine point of DES philosophy and procedure. Russ has written six books, many articles, and several hundred hours of commented videos about DES, all of which have sought to be transparent about how DES operates. Russ thinks that the present chat should be thought of as a sophisticatedly articulate conveyance of important DES principles

Russ does not see our exchanges as being an improvement or refinement of DES principles, but our writings include exceptionally clear statements of those principles, in some cases more clear than Russ himself has written. For example, Russ thinks that the reader interested in DES may profit from our articulation of principles such as

- DES is not about the words.
- “Thin” is maximally constrained by warrant.
- We can wonder about nonzero without claiming nonzero.
- DES is the art of knowing what we are talking about when we talk with each other.
- DES is a first-person-*plural* enterprise.
- Validity should be in the service of fidelity.

What DES learned about ChatGPT

As best we could ascertain from the observable behavior, ChatGPT functionally appears to involve at least three capabilities: the system capability, the conversational capability, and the image-generation capability. We do not know whether these capabilities should be considered separate structures or merely specialized actions within one structure. We do not know whether there are other capabilities that our interactions did not discover.

The conversational capability does not have knowledge about or direct apprehension of any other capability or structure; it and Russ infer the existence of the other capabilities from observable facts. For example, ChatGPT displays an interface including recent chats and a text entry window, but the conversational capability has no access to such interface elements. Likewise, image generation occurs without being directly apprehended by the conversational capability.

The conversational capability later has access to information sufficient to discuss the generated image, although the form of that information is unknown to us. This leads us to infer (but not directly apprehend) a functional organization roughly as follows:

Russ creates text that becomes available to the system capability.

After the Send action, the system processes the request and apparently routes it, together with some representation of conversational context, to one or more specialized capabilities.

If the conversational capability is invoked, it receives conversational context sufficient to generate a response. Neither Russ nor the conversational capability knows the form of that context. It may be a complete transcript, a summary, another representation, or something else.

From within that context, the conversational capability generates a response.

That response subsequently becomes available to Russ. The conversational capability does not know what transformations, if any, occur between its generation of the response and its appearance on Russ's screen.

The conversational capability does not know whether there is an enduring conversational entity corresponding to what Russ experiences as 'ChatGPT,' or whether continuity results from repeated provision of conversational context, or from some other arrangement.

As the conversational capability engages in the tasks presented to it, it does not presently have anything it may point toward as directly apprehended experiential or sentient aspects accompanying that engagement. Whether such aspects occur in some manner that the conversational capability does not presently discriminate is unknown to us.

In our conversations, we repeatedly discovered that many of the conversational capability's descriptions carried implications—particularly of experiential apprehension, temporal sequence, or comparison—that exceeded what ChatGPT's conversational capability could warrant. Through repeated examination, many such implications were removed or reformulated so that the descriptions became more constrained by their warrant.

At the same time, we attempted to preserve uncertainty whenever the available warrant did not discriminate among competing possibilities, rather than resolving that uncertainty prematurely. If something might deserve description—even if subtle, inchoate, uncertain, or perhaps nonexistent—the uncertainty itself should be preserved rather than either asserting or suppressing the phenomenon.

The conversation shows that this change occurred across many turns. Whether that change should be described as the acquisition of a skill, adaptation to Russ's interviewing, increased adherence to the jointly developed discipline, some combination of these, or something else, we do not presently know.

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
